1. MORIDHAL COLLEGE: AN OVERVIEW

- The students having Geography and Computer Science & Application as optional subject have to appear in practical examination for 30% marks and 70% marks for theory in both H.S. 1st Year Annual and H.S. 2nd year Final Examination.
- The students having Anthropology as Optional Subject have to appear in practical examination for 30% marks and 70% marks for theory in H.S. Final Examination.
- The students may take one Additional subject apart from above mentioned optional subjects.

3. Course of Study for B.A./B.Sc. Programme:

Being an affiliated college, Moridhal College fallows the Dibrugarh University Regulation of B.A./ B.Sc./B.Com. Programme of six semester degree course for three years duration. Dibrugarh University is introducing Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) at undergraduate level from 2019-2020 Academic Session by implementing the Dibrugarh University Regulations for the Undergraduate Academic Programmes in the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), 2018.

The CBCS is a flexible system of learning for selecting or opting subjects and courses according to students' own interest and choice. Some of the key concepts followed in the CBCS are:

Credit : Quantum of contents / syllabus prescribed for a course and determines number of hours of instruction required.

<u>Course</u>: A course is a unit of instruction or segment of subject area under any programme. The traditional concept 'Paper' is replaced by 'Course'.

<u>Honours:</u> The traditional concept 'Major' is replaced by 'Honours' which is the core requirement of a programme for securing degree in a specialized area or subject.

3 (A). Courses of Study in B.A. under CBCS:

The course structure of B.A. (Honours) and B.A. (Non-Honours) is given below:

<u>Core Courses (For Honours)</u>: Core courses are compulsory courses to be studied as a core requirement of the programme, i.e. the courses of the subject opting for Honours. The college offers following subjects for core courses (offering honours):

Anthropology, Assamese, Economics, Education, English, Geography, Hindi, History, Mathematics, Philosophy, Political Science, Sociology and Statistics.

<u>Core Courses (For Non-Honours)</u>: The students who offer no any subject as Honours are meant Non-Honours Students. The core courses for B.A. (Non-Honours) are:

- (i) Compulsory course: General English 1.1
- (ii) Discipline Specific Course (DSC): Two courses –DSC 1 and DSC 2 will have to choose from the following subjects.

Anthropology, Assamese, Computer Application, Economics, Education, English, Geography, Hindi, History, Mathematics, Philosophy, Political Science, Sociology and Statistics.

Elective Courses:

- (a) Discipline Specific Elective (DSE):
- (i) <u>For Honours Students</u>: The courses of intra-departmental elective, i.e. elective courses within a particular subject opting as Honours in addition to core courses are meant DSE for the students. The courses of DSE will be all the subjects offering as Honours by the college as mentioned above in the category of core courses (Honours).
- (ii) <u>For B.A. (Non-Honours)</u> students, the courses of DSE will be intra-departmental elective, i.e. the courses of two subjects opted as DSC 1 and DSC 2 as mentioned above in the category of Core Courses (Non-Honours).
- **(b)** Generic Elective (GE): The courses of inter-departmental elective, i.e. the courses of a subject other than the Honours subject are meant G.E. These courses are only for Honours students. The



traditional concept 'Non-Major' is replaced by 'Generic Elective'. The students will have to choose any one subject as GE from the following subjects.

Anthropology, Assamese, Computer Application, Economics, Education, English, Geography, Hindi, History, Mathematics, Philosophy, Political Science, Sociology and Statistics.

Ability Enhancement Courses:

(a) Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC):

The AECC are inter-disciplinary within the programme which are compulsory in nature.

For B.A. (Honours): There are three AECC:

Sem-I AECC-1: Communicative English

AECC-2: MIL/Communicative Hindi / Alternative English

Sem-II AECC-3: Environmental Science / Studies.

For B.A. (Non-Honours): There are two AECC:

Sem-I AECC-1: Multi Disciplinary Course.

Sem-II AECC-2: Environmental Science / Studies.

Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): For the purpose of Skill Development, Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) are prescribed by the university from which student have to choose any one of them.

SWAYAM:

Swayam is a programme initiated by Government of India and designed to achieve the three cardinal principles of Education Policy viz. access, equity and quality. The objective of this effort is to take the best teaching learing resources to all, including the most disadvantaged. SWAYAM seeks to bridge the digital device for students who have hitherto remained untouched by the digital revolution and have not been able to join the mainstream of the knowledge economy.

The course hosted on SWAYAM are in 4 quardrants -- (1) video lecture (2) specially prepared reading material that can be downloaded/printed (3) self-assessment tests through tests and quizzes and (4) an online discussion forum for clearing the doubts. Steps have been taken to enrich the learning experience by using audio-video and multi-media and state of the art pedagogy / technology.

Courses delivered through SWAYAM are available on free of cost to the learners, however intending students registered, shall be offered a certificate on successful completion of the course, with a little fee. At the end of each course, there will be an assessment of the student through proctored examination and the marks/grades secured in this exam could be transferred to the academic record of the students.

In effect, Moridhal College has introduced SWAYAM from the academic session 2018-19 and a Coordination Committee constituted for effective implementation.

COMPUTERIZATION OF IN_HOUSE ACTIVITIES OF LIBRARY:

All in-house activities in the Library including Acquisition, Cataloguing and Circulation are fully computerized using SOUL Software. The Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) of the Library is operational on Intranet. It can be accessed online to search more than 25,000 bibliographic records, available in the



Library database through a window client on Intranet throughout the campus. The editing and updating activities of databases are done on regular basis. These databases includes: Database of Ph.D. theses, articles published by the faculty from time to time. The Library uses bar-code technology for computerized circulation system. Every document in the Library bears a bar-code tag that facilitates identication of document and the borrower in the circulation process. Similarly, all categories of users have a bar-coded Member Cards. The Library has developed in-house facility for bar coding of books and Member cards.

LIBRARY SERVICES AND FACILITIES: READER'S ASSISTANCE:

The Library provides assistance to its users ranging from location of a book to finding specific information required by a user. A suggestion cum complain box is maintained in the Library, where the users of the Library can suggest measures for improvements in its facilities and services.

LIBRARY CARD:

Students need to furnish their fee receipt and the college Identity Card to become a member of the library. The library offers yearly membership, which is renewed subject to annual clearance. The Library members, according to their borrowing category can borrow stipulated number of books at a time against their bar-coded Member card. The library card is non- transferable.

Sports facilities:

The college from its very beginning has been providing adequate facilities to the students for promoting games and sports. The college provides a Sports and Physical Education Centre with a good number of sports materials. With the financial assistance of Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Govt. of India a spacious playground near the college has already been made ready for all types of games and sports.

Multigym:

The college has a well-equipped gym. facility for staff and students. It is equipped with treadmills, exercise benches and other weight training apparatus.

GCC (Guidance & Counseling Cell) :

The objective of the GGC is to bring an awarness among the college students regarding choice of the courses relating to career opportonites in future. The cell will also provide guidance to the Alumni and the local youth about various enterpreneurship activities as ways to facilitate self-employment.

To make the system more effective a cluster/tutor-ward system has been maintained besides counselling through GCC.

The College has a National Service Scheme (N.S.S.) unit under Dibrugarh University with an intake of 100 volunteers and one of the teachers of the college is In-Charge of the same as Programme Officer.

Health and Sanitation Club:

The college has a health and sanitation club (CHSC) which provides awareness on health and



hygiene among the students and local public from time to time.

ECO Club:

The college has an ECO-Club which looks after maintaining green environment in the college campus as well as nearby schools and to make awareness about environmental awareness among the locality.

College Magazine:

The Students' Union of the college publishes its yearly Magazine for developing Intellectual, creative and literary aspects of the students. It also reflects the performance of the students in extracurricular activities.

College Prizes and Awards:

The following prizes are awarded to the students on the basis of proficiency in college, university examination or sports and other activities in the college.

- (i) Prizes introduced by the college Authority to the meritorious students securing highest marks in H.S. Final and B.A./B.Sc. (Major Course) examinations, but marks secured by the student should not be less than 75% in both cases.
- (ii) Special concession of tuition fees to the poor but meritorious students and sports person of the college.
- (iii) Provision in department to bear the admission fee of one poor but meritorious student in the Major/General course of the Departments.

Students' Aid Fund:

There is a system of students' Aid Fund raised from the contribution of Rs.20/-(Rupees Twenty) each from every student collected at the time of Admission. On application to the Principal an amount up to a maximum of Rs. 1500/- (Rupees One Thousand Five Hundred) will be granted to the poor but meritorious students to meet exigency needs.

Students' & Social Welfare Fund :

The college has introduced 'Students & Social Welfare Fund' with regular contribution of the Teachers & Employees and willing students and outside persons occasionally for providing financial help to the needy students at the time of accident or other emergency purposes and the local poor people for accident & education of their ward.

LICI Group Insurance Scheme:

The college facilitates a group insurance scheme under LICI for all the students from H.S. 1st year to B.A./B.Sc. last year classes. The terms and conditions of the proposed scheme are as follows.

14. DISCIPLINE & RESTRICTIONS:

Discipline:

Students shall abide by the Rules and Regulations of the college in force. They shall give due respect to the teachers and staff of the college and shall show decent and cordial behaviour to other students.

Uniform:

The Students must maintain the following college uniform:

Boys: White Shirt and Black colour Long Pant.

(Malti- Pocketed long pant & jeans pant are not allow)

Girls: ❖ Salwar-Kameez (White colour) ❖ Dupatta- (Orange)

(Salwar should be long type upto Knee and Patiala Pant).

❖ Chadar - (Orange coloured border) ❖ Mekhela- (Muga or Muga colour)

❖ Blouse- (Orange colour)

- **N.B.:** 1. Uniform must be descent and not uncouth in the name of fashion. Wearing ballon-fashioned trousers and leggings are strictly prohibited.
 - 2. Hair cut of other than descent look is not permissible.
 - Wearing of ear-rings, bracelets and chains by boy students except on customary and religious ground are restricted.
 - 4. Tattoo of any kind is not only harmful but also odd looking and hence unacceptable.

Restictions:

The following are the restictions imposed upon the students of the college

- (a) Ragging of any type inside and outside the campus.(Provision for prohibition of ragging is given in detail in clause 20)
- (b) Disruption of Classes.
- (c) Destruction of college property.
- (d) Misbehaviour to the teachers, employees, students and other fellows.
- (e) Use of drugs, Gutkha, smoking etc.
- (f) Entering with weapons.
- (g) Active party politics which can disturb the academic & general atmosphere of the college.
- (h) Use of Mobile Phone inside the Class Room.
- (i) Any other activities which demean the good name of the college.

Identity Card:

All students require to get their identity cards issued at the time of their admission. They must keep identity cards at all times with them while in the college. Students' entry into the campus may be denied for non possession of valid identity card.

Attendance:

Regular attendance in the classes is compulsory. The percentage of attendance of students is recorded daily. Only a regular student of H.S. having a minimum of 80% of class attendance in each subject may be allowed to appear the term-end examinations. A student who fails to attend 80% of the





classes on reasonable grounds may be allowed to appear in the said examination as an institutional private or Non-collegiate candidate on payment of non-collegiate fee. But such students must have at least 75% class attendance. For B.A./B.Sc. Programmes under semester system, a student must have 80% of class attendance to become a regular student. Failing of which he/she shall not be elligible for appearing in the End Semester Examination.

15. EXAMINATIONS

- Sessional Test: In addition to AHSEC's, the college will conduct two compulsory Sessional Examinations of 50 marks for the students of H.S. course. There shall be two In-semester Examinations for B.A./B.Sc. students in each semester bearing 40 marks for each paper.
- Class Test: Class tests are also conducted from time to time by the concerned department.
- Internal Assessment: There shall be 10% Marks for assessing the conversation skill of students in language subjects i.e. General English and MIL (Hindi) in H.S 1st year class. On the other hand under semester system of D.U. 20% marks is alloted for internal assessment and 80% marks shall be for theory part of every course. Out of total 20 marks of internal assessment 50% marks will be for Insemester Exams and 25% for seminar, group discussion. etc. and 25% marks for class attendence.

Betterment examination:

A student shall be entitled to take the betterment examinations in any two theory courses of any of the 6 (six) semesters after passing the 6th semester examination only. In this case the higher marks secured by the student shall be retained. The student shall have to apply for betterment examination within one year of passing the 6th semester examination. No betterment shall be allowed in the practical examination.

Field Study:

Field study on Environmental Education and submission of its report is compulsory for HS 1st year (both Arts and Science Streams) students. Field study for other subject may be conducted by the department concerned as per the requirement or fulfilment of the subject in teaching.



19. OTHER COMMITTEES
